





Another year and we still must talk about Covid19. Over the past eighteen months, we here in Maggie have been impacted by this deadly virus. Each of us have had family, friends, or neighbors get sick or pass away because of this virus. My heart goes out to those of us that have been impacted by Covid19. Together, we will get through this.

Cabin rentals and hotel rooms continue to book, bringing in tourists to enjoy our valley. While our businesses have had a great year, they have been impacted by Covid19, as well as by staffing shortages. Restaurants and retail shops have had to adjust days of operation and in some cases have had to close because of exposure to Covid19. We still see restaurants not open to inside dining. Please be patient and remember to help support our local restaurants and shops. *Together we rock!* 

Last year the county completed a property evaluation. The results of this evaluation allowed our Board of Aldermen to lower the tax rate to 40 cents. Maggie Valley remains the lowest tax rate in Haywood County while continuing to give our taxpayers excellent services.

In 2020 the Census was completed. We are happy to report that, in Haywood County, Maggie Valley had the highest percent gain in population for the last ten years. Our actual population gain was higher than Waynesville and Canton combined. Maggie Valley also had the highest percent of population increase in the seven western counties of North Carolina. We are seeing a continued rise in

building permits for homes, condos, and cabins. I heard a quote about this; "What makes a town a great place to live also gives people a great place to visit."

The outlook for the 2021 – 2022 season is a bright one. Fall should be great as most hotels and cabin rentals have booked up through October. In November we will be able to light up Maggie Valley for the winter. Our winter lighting program has yet another new lighting scene to install on the west end of town. A special thanks again to the Tourism Development Authority and Maggie's one percent board, for your continued contribution to this program.

The Festival Grounds continue to be an economic and cultural catalyst for the Town. With each passing year the diversity of assembled events continues to evolve drawing both locals and tourists alike. There is truly something for everyone on the event calendar. This past Festival Season was one of the best ever – the grounds hosted 23 unique festivals and events for a total of 45 event days.

On Tuesday, November 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2021, we have an election to fill two Alderman seats on the board. There are four great candidates running this year to fill those two positions. Know the issues and know the candidates. This is your chance to have your voice heard.

As your Mayor, I want to thank the citizens of Maggie Valley and the surrounding community for your continued support over the past year. The Valley has overcome a lot this past year and more challenges are in front of us. Together we will meet these challenges and continue to move forward. Maggie Valley continues to be an appealing place to live, work, and play. During 2021, Maggie Valley Planning and Development has continuously provided permitting and inspection services for our residents, citizens, and visitors.

More than one hundred zoning permits have been issued for new construction and development projects in Town in the first eight months of the year. Twenty of these permits were issued for the construction of new residences. We have welcomed new commercial establishments and worked with others to complete renovations. Plans continue to take shape for many other new and newly remodeled restaurants, shops, and commercial accommodations.

As part of our ongoing effort to help keep our valley attractive, the Planning Department continues to issue Notice of Violation letters. These efforts address nuisances and various other Code violations. As this is an ongoing process, the Town appreciates everyone's hard work and help in improving the appearance of Maggie Valley.

I would like to share some happenings in our agency. We would like to welcome two new officers who have chosen Maggie Valley for public service: Officer Michael Herbertson and Officer Rodney Riddle. Kg Officer Logan Wood and Goose completed their annual USPCA certification. Kg Officer Wood continues to train Goose into an all service Kg in narcotics detection, tracking and article searches.

Officer training and education is always principal in providing a high level of service to our community. The Covid outbreak has limited in-person training to some degree. However, webinars have become a training resource during this pandemic situation. We encourage our Officers to seek higher education through obtaining an Associates of Applied Science degree or a Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice or related field. Lieutenant Matthew Boger and Sergeant Jeff Mackey both obtained an Associate in Applied Science in Criminal Justice. We congratulate them on their achievements.

We continue to maintain a Prescription Drop-Off box at the front entrance of our Police Department. We encourage and appreciate our citizens depositing unused prescription drugs for destruction. This is one way we continue to partner together to help combat the opioid crisis that our country is experiencing.


## We can't thank you enough!

The Town of Maggie Valley's fiscal health and financial outlook remains strong. A couple of distinctions the Town takes great pride in are – Maggie Valley enjoys the lowest municipal tax rate among Haywood County Municipalities at \$0.40, three cents down from the previous year's tax rate of \$0.43 and – Maggie Valley's General Fund remains completely debt fee for a second straight year.

On August 12, 2021, the US Census released population data and results collected though the 2020 Census. The results of the Census indicate that Maggie Valley is continuing to add residential population each year throughout the last decade. We have added more new residents in the last ten years than Waynesville and Canton combined. This serves as a reminder that Maggie Valley is not only a great place to visit but a great place to live year around!

Maggie Valley will celebrate its 50th year as an incorporated municipality in 2024. It will be interesting to see if the Town will cross the 2,000-resident threshold — only 313 to go.

# Can the grease!

Pouring cooking fats and grease down the kitchen drain is a recipe for disaster! These substances build up in your home's plumbing and in the Town of Maggie Valley's sewer system. That's bad news for your pipes and ours.

Why? Clogged pipes can cause sewage to back-up into your home, yard, streets, or waterways.

How can you help prevent grease from blocking sewer lines? Never pour grease down the drain!

Not even with dish soap and hot water! Instead pour cooled grease into an empty can and place it in the trash. Put strainers in sinks to catch scraps and empty them into the trash. Use rubber scrapers and paper towels to remove oil and grease from cookware. Scrape food scraps into the trash and avoid using a garbage disposal for this waste.

# **OUR CURBSIDE SERVICES**

# Garbage & Recycling Pick-up

One of the Town's most popular residential services is our weekly curbside garbage and recycling pick-up. Garbage pick-up is on Monday and recycling is on Tuesday. Curbside garbage and recycling pickups may be affected by some holidays! In addition to providing these pick-up services, the Town provides residential customers with a 95-gallon brown bin to manage your bagged household garbage and a 64-gallon blue bin for your clean loose mixed recyclables. For those who haven't gotten theirs, containers are available for pick-up or delivery to your home.

Lost or stolen containers may be replaced for a charge.





### Yard Debris Pick-up

This service is provided for bagged trimmings & leaves, limbs, brush, branches, etc. Please use the paper yard bags or black plastic bags. Brush, branches, and limbs (no longer than 12'in length and no larger than 4" in diameter) should be piled with cut ends facing the street.

#### White Goods Pick-up

Provided for stoves, refrigerators, gas grills, washers, dryers, microwaves, freezers, and other discarded appliances.

#### E-Waste Pick-up

Provided for discarded **printers**, **TVs**, **copiers**, **computers**, etc.

#### **County Solid Waste**

Please call Haywood County Solid Waste at 828-627-8042 for disposal information, as carpet, fluorescent light bulbs, tires, building materials, mattresses, paint, and stumps will not be picked up.

#### Pay Online:

#### Pay by Mail:

Make a check payable to the Town of Maggie Valley and pay by mail. Please include the bottom portion of your tax bill and write your parcel identification number in the memo field of your check. We accept postmark as date received for tax payments. If you would like to receive a receipt, include your email address or a stamped selfaddressed envelope.
