service related to the storm. Our team ensured 24-hour coverage for the town and collaborated with neighboring agencies to provide support where needed. After experiencing a brief communication outage, we quickly reestablished our

systems using a temporary satellite-based server, allowing us to maintain effective communication. During the two-week recovery period, our agency conducted approximately 200 welfare checks on residents in need of assistance. Additionally, we provided security at the Maggie Valley Town Hall Pavilion,

which served as an emergency supply donation and distribution site. We extend our heartfelt gratitude to all who donated, volunteered, and assisted during this challenging time. A special thank you goes out to the Maggie Valley Fire and Rescue team for their tremendous support through-

out the event. They truly are the heroes of our community.
